You will note from the calender that all S.A.A. Northern thermal events are to be held at Balmedie this year. This is mainly an attempt to encourage a more even apread of entries from the Northern Area by centralising the competitions. Hopefully

this will cut down the travelling time and costs for many competitors. In addition to this of course, we have the traditional Elgin events which, I am informed, are well worth attending ('free food, etc.)

Another very welcome change to the calender is the moving to Knock Hill of the venue for the slope competitions. This is a superb hill with excellent views and slopes all round which suit virtually all wind directions. ADS made a good showing at last year's Knock Trophy (Teun 2nd equal) so hopefully thrend will continue this year.

Other events to look forward to this year include the now traditional ADS invasion of Fife for the Lomond Trophy (April 4th), our own Tuesday evening events (for something completely different) and hopefully a few club camping week-ends (dates will be announced nearer the time).

So now it's on with the newsletter. I hope you will all find something of interest within and I wish everyone good flying in 1982.

ADS in 1981

Reports on the various competitions and club activities have been given in the October and November newslatter. But some other activities are still worthwhile mentioning, and others re-mentioning, so here is 1981 in a souring nutshell

Some of you might have forgotten in the meantime but the winter of early 1981 was a rather mild one. The slopes were visited frequently and the windbreak served a good purpose.

Unfortunately the first helf of the summer was in fact a continuation of the same mild winter, the only noticeable difference was the opportunity to see the rain in the evening rether than only hear it. The competitions suffered equally and it was not until August that we had the first "dry" competition day. The term "thermal competition suggests a certain amount of heat. That's wrong: thermals require a

temperature difference, but it doesn't say snything about the absolute temperature.

The weather and probably the uncertainty about the safe use of 27 MHz were two factors that somewhat reduced attendance at competitions. Fuel prices and the reluctance to travel large distances played a role as well.

Also the flying outside the competitions changed from that in 1980. With Graham Philip moving to his new flat the automotic answering and information service called Mrs. Philip ceased to exist. As it sometimes became more difficult to find out "where the action is" small groups of members organised themselves and went out on their own.

There is nothing evelust such a development: it is up to everybody's personal choics where he wants to go. But when people like to go to a common place (either because of they want some help with their flying, or just because of they like flying with a few others around) then the possibility should be there. With Graham rether frequently not at home (he is interested in more than one sort of model nowedays) the local telephone for 1982 will be Mike Pirie (323640). On Tuesday evenings at say 5 pm and on Sundays at around 9 am he will usually be in a position to tell you how and what.

In 1980 we obtained approval for the use of both Selmedie and Durris. During 1981 both were used intensively and, more important, sensibly. For both sites we now have a "good name". Let's keep it that way in 1982!

The turnout of the 1981 ACM in October was rather disappointing, eight members of which three were from the committee. On the three first-Tuesdey-of-the-month get togethers the turnout was rether small as well. All three times (in November, December and January) the same group of 3-4 members plus 1 or 2 others. This in spite of additional advertising through press and model shop.

The optimistic approach is that everyoody is happy with the way the club is running. The pessimistic approach is to say that nobody comes because they can't influence it anyway. As usual the truth will be somewhere in the middle. But when some of you do have ideas or suggestions, please let us know.

We hope that as from early April onwards the Tuesday evening will come into operation erain. More details are in a separate section. The first Tuesday evening of the month will then be a bit special again. See you there!

Repeatedly it has been suggested that the newslatter should be issued more frequent. Last year Mike Pirio published four: January, April, October and November. Seemingly a bit of a sap in the summer but as we see each other rather frequent over that period, as there is little time left between flying and repairing, and as there is little new information to be published it is quite an acceptable gap.

What would certainly help, is if other members than Mike or myself would write an article or a competition report. It would be a bit of a shock to Mike (after a year of trying to get others to write) but it would make his task so much easier and add snother tone to our newsletter.

I will end with the same wish as last year, maybe it work this time for the full year: A good lift for everybody, and hopefully a bit more sunshine as well.

Kit Review No. 307.

KERRers have once easin produced a kit of a most unusual siroraft - this time it's that notorious plane, the LOGANair BARNStormer. It was therefore with some apprehension that I accepted the job of reviewing this kit. As I always say, there's nothing like a good challenge - so here goes:-

The Kit. Initially I had some difficulty in obtaining the kit, but eventually found it in that well known Edinburgh model shop, McCiONVIDLE Models. It cost me a BOB or two, so I hope it is worth it. First impressions of the kit were very good - no GERRY-built kit this. The contents of the kit revealed a LOVELY fibUGLASS fuselage, STARR o foam wings and other parts TAYLOR made to fit. Pairings are in ADS plastic.

Building was quite straight forward and it was ready to fly after a few evenings work.

Flying. The day came at last when the model could be test flown from our local slope at KAYm-hill. The wind was a bit strong, but with a wing loading of 45 GRehAMs per sq dom, this didn't present any real problem. With a hefty shove, it was off. No problems initially - very stable in flight and no tendency to YAU.

After flyIAN about for a while, I decided that it was time to try a few manogyres. Things were going well until I tried an Immelman TEUN - it was then that things started to go desperately wrong. - It PHILIPED over once or twice while I desperately stirred the sticks trying to avoid ALANding in a BROOVTIELD. I couldn't ANDERSton - so I just gave up and waited for the inevitable crunch. And after that I need a dRINK rather badly.

Conclusions. After such a promising start, what a PIRTE the headling of this mechine wasn't up to MUFCH. And so regretfully I have to conclude that if you ever find yourself possessing one of these kits (you might get one in a present) the test thing you can do is BARNETSON! I know how mine ended up. In fact, I WISHART bought something else - a HOSIE STRONACH or a McCURRACH MOMPSON - anything but a LOGANAIR BARNStormer! (terrible wasn't it!)


4.5.82 100 8

The competitions have to start in time to avoid that it becomes a night landing competition. We will sim at starting at 1900 hrs.


There is no entry fee. A "fun" prize will be evailable for the winner.
